Making the hard choices needed to safeguard essential services

Across the country councils are facing a perfect storm caused by prolonged increase in demand for services, high interest rates, and the effects of the previous Government's austerity measures. Waltham Forest is not immune to these challenges.

We have always tried to make sound financial decisions in the interests of residents. We have a legal duty to balance the budget and a moral duty to protect the most vulnerable. Over the next few months, we will be putting measures in place to meet both these demands.

To give you an idea of the challenges we face, we are looking after 1,000 more elderly and disabled adults than we were four years ago. The number of local people presenting as homeless has gone up 50 per cent in the past year alone, while the number of children needing special Education, Health and Care plans has risen from 1,800 to 3,000 over the past three years.

Since 2010, we have made savings of £120million. But even so, after 13 years of austerity, we are facing a significant budget deficit. Tough choices will have to be made about everything we do.

What is not a choice is doing nothing. That would leave us unable to protect the services residents need. You have my personal commitment that every decision we take will prioritise and protect residents. In this issue of Waltham Forest News, you can find details of the costof-living support we have put in place this winter to help residents.

This includes information about free events taking place to celebrate Christmas with the family. You can also find coverage of the winners of our annual Pride of the Borough awards that took place in early December.

I hope that you enjoy a fantastic Christmas and New Year. I'd like to thank all those emergency service staff who will be working over the holidays to keep us all safe. And please remember to keep an eye out for anyone who may be sleeping rough – you can help connect rough sleepers with local support services by visiting **thestreetlink.org.uk**

MAYOR'S UPDATE •

More support for our local armed forces community

After marking Remembrance Sunday on 12 November with a ceremony at Fellowship Square, Mayor Roy Berg joined Cllr Vicky Ashworth, Cabinet Member for Jobs, Social Inclusion, and Communities, alongside former and serving armed forces personnel to renew the borough's commitment to the Armed Forces Covenant.

The covenant, established in 2011, aims to ensure that forces personnel and their families are treated fairly and their sacrifices are recognised. Waltham Forest originally signed in 2013 and used the tenyear anniversary as an opportunity to renew the commitment and launch the Armed Forces Action Plan that outlines how the council will support the armed forces community.

Nominate a building for our Local Heritage List

We are updating our Local Heritage List, which celebrates characterful and historic buildings and structures in Waltham Forest.

The list is a way to learn more about our shared heritage and spaces that makes Waltham Forest a special place to live, work and visit.

Unique to Waltham Forest, the list includes buildings

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identified by you, local community groups, and the Council.

To help improve the Local Heritage list, we need your help. Tell us which buildings in your area have historical, cultural, and architectural interest that represent our diverse borough.

The existing Local Heritage List already includes a range of structures from private

houses to public libraries, mosques to monuments, schools to shopfronts, factories to fountains but we want to broaden this out even further

And it's not just old buildings we want to celebrate, we also want to add modern buildings of high-quality design too.

Being on the list does not limit how buildings are used or prevent changes to them, but

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where planning applications are submitted, any impact on a locally listed building would be considered as part of the planning assessment.

WALTHAM FOREST

The Waltham Forest Civic Society commented: "We are pleased to see the Local Heritage List is being updated.

The list is an important means to raise awareness of our built heritage which gives our

townscapes and streets their unique character - whether public buildings, individual houses or interesting historic features - that can so easily be lost, demolished or damaged beyond repair if we don't recognise their value in time.

We encourage residents to get involved and send in their suggestions for additions to the list."

Check out local landmarks on the list for inspiration...

A tall drink of water next to the **Butler's Retreat in Chingford**

Unveiled in 1899, the drinking fountain was used by visitors to the forest at a time when the area was a major tourist destination. It was the gift of the MP Sir Edwin Durning-Lawrence Bt, as a memorial to his two older brothers.



The Rose & Crown, Hoe Street, **Walthamstow**

The Rose & Crown was built in around 1891 by the Truman Hanbury & Buxton Brewery, and designed by Fred Ashton, a local architect based in Stratford. It is a good example of a distinctive and largely original late Victorian corner pub, with attractive decorative detailing.

We're investing in Waltham Forest



Cllr Ahsan Khan explains how new developments fund improvements that benefit everyone

"Some of the things that residents and visitors most enjoy about the borough are only here because of development. The funding and direct investment we receive is used to pay for essential infrastructure improvements and attractions that we would otherwise not be able to afford.

"The projects that have benefitted include work to upgrade the Blackhorse Road area, and the creation of new health facilities like the doctor's surgery at the Jazz Yard. We have been able to make changes for cyclists and pedestrians including improved lighting and better surfaces. It also means we can create places like the Walthamstow Wetlands, the Feel Good centres, and Lea Bridge Library for people to relax and enjoy leisure time as they support local businesses.

"We wanted to take this opportunity to look at some of the great things right across the borough that have been made possible through this funding. Of course, there are some areas where there has been more development, which in turn results in more funding in these places to create even better neighbourhoods and town centres.

"It's because of our track record of success in delivering the changes that benefit residents and visitors that we have been awarded one of the highest amounts of Levelling Up funding by the Government in London. In total, we have received around £39m to spend on projects in Leyton, Higham Park and Chingford Mount, and Walthamstow."

Due to the lack of development in Chingford and Highams Park, there are fewer funds to spend on new facilities. That's not stopped us from working hard to achieve the best for residents.

Following lots of engagement with residents including the Highams Park Planning Group over the past two years around the Chingford Mount Area Framework, we made a successful bid for \pounds 8.4m of Levelling Up Funds working in partnership with councillors and the local MP.

On top of this, we were able to contribute an extra \pounds 1.9m bringing the total to \pounds 10.3m that will be invested

to improve Chingford Mount and Highams Park town centres as well as parks including Memorial Park, Chase Lane Park, and Rolls Park.

We've been speaking to residents about how to refine the improvements even further, more recently in Chase Lane Park with Everyone on Boards in October.

Community

The south

Coronation Square, near the Leyton Orient stadium, will provide 750 new homes alongside new leisure, sports, and cultural spaces, providing a place for people to relax and shop in Leyton town centre.

The work also aims to make people feel safer through new street lighting and better visibility.

The development is centred around water fountains and a public square that will become the heart of the new community.

It also includes plans for a new health hub, a pre-school nursery, an enhanced indoor sports and leisure centre with community facilities, and new commercial space for shops and businesses. Work is expected to fully complete by the end of 2026. Environmental upgrades in Leytonstone include a new Sustainable Urban Drainage System outside Leytonstone School, the introduction of the Business Low Emissions Neighbourhood, and improvements to Jubilee Gardens.

We've recently completed 47 new homes at Leyton Green Road that have funded Lester House, which stands opposite on Leyton Green Road and provides stateof-the-art facilities for young disabled people since opening in 2020.

Improvements to Leyton Tube Station such as step-free access are vital as the borough grows. We were able to fulfil a longstanding commitment of £9m towards the upgrades using funding from developments, and received another £13.7m from our joint Levelling Up Fund bid with TfL. Work will begin in 2024.









The middle

Thanks to new homes and developments in Walthamstow and Blackhorse Lane, we can invest and apply for more funds to improve facilities that make your life easier.

We've set aside funds to pay for a potential new entrance to Walthamstow Central underground station from the redeveloped 17&Central mall, and we continue to work with government and the Mayor of London to look for the rest of the funding. There are improvements being made to public spaces in the town centre along Hoe Street, High Street and St James Street to make Walthamstow a safer and welcoming cultural destination with the £17.2m of Levelling Up Funding awarded to Waltham Forest by the government.

Funds from developments have allowed us to invest in the Soho Theatre Walthamstow building and create a touchdown space for the University of Portsmouth – these two projects alone are predicted to generate over £500m for the local economy over the next 20 years. We are improving Chestnuts House, Hatherley Mews, and Vestry House Museum to create a cultural quarter in the heart of Walthamstow for everyone to enjoy. We've also been able to open a new custom-built library on Wood Street and the much-loved Fellowship Square.

Over at Blackhorse Lane, we're continuing to make improvements. Without developer funding, we wouldn't have been able to build the Sinnott Medical Centre for residents which opened in May 2022, allowing it to expand from 6,500 to 10,000 patients over the next 15 years. We're also making huge improvements to public spaces along Sutherland Road including more CCTV. We also completed the Lockwood Way project in summer 2022, a part of the Creative Enterprise Zone where local businesses receive support to help create new jobs.

Community Living Rooms: a space for everyone

Last year, community spaces across the borough opened their doors to welcome anyone who needed somewhere warm to go.

The Winter Spaces Network included places of worship, cafes, local businesses, libraries and charities.

Together, they helped people who might have been struggling with energy bills in their homes, or who wanted a warm space to socialise, have a cup of tea, or work.

Many of these spaces have stayed open throughout the

year, and we now have 27 Community Living Rooms (as these spaces are now known) open across Waltham Forest.

As with last year, these are spaces open for anyone to drop in, and many now offer a range of activities, information, support and guidance.

Highams Park Food Aid is one of the Community Living

Rooms who give immediate support to residents experiencing food poverty. As well as food and household essentials, they are offering free haircuts throughout December.

Lily, Hub Manager at Highams Park Food Aid, said: "We have a community café, where we have hot drinks and a hot meal for lunch every day.

"That means people can get out of the house, talk to our befriending team, and be greeted with a friendly face and a listening ear."

A day with the Salvation Army

The Salvation Army Hub provide a Community Living Room on Forest Road in Walthamstow, open every Friday from 10am to 1pm.

Their Living Room has newspapers, crafts, board games, internet access and computers, a play space, and light snacks.

Julie Pell, who helps to run the Salvation Army Hub living room, shared a snapshot of one day in November:

- 65 people attended 42 adults and 23 children.
- We shared cups of tea, cake and a chat with the people who came and invited them to bring friends or neighbours

 We gave items to people in need, including clothing, bedding, and emergency food parcels

- We signposted people towards information and advice, including:
 - How to access to preschool groups that are free or low cost
 - Information about the Warmer Homes initiative, where we can provide advice to keep energy bills down.
 - o Support for victims of domestic abuse

Each Community Living Room has different activities and support on offer.

These can include:

- Hot food, tea, coffee and snacks
- Digital inclusion support

 help using devices and getting access to the internet
- Free WiFi and access to computers
- Citizens' Advice Waltham Forest – providing free advice on money, debt and benefits
- Energy support from HEET helping to lower your energy bills
- Exercise classes at Better Leisure Centres
- Craft activities and materials
- Free hygiene products

 Use your microwave more - it's cheaper than an electric oven




- Keep lids on

Winie

"My name is Winifred, but everyone calls me Winie – with one 'n'! I get a lot of joy from being here. I like to think I'm entertaining children, and they're enjoying what I'm telling them. They love all the stories, and they're very enthusiastic. I'm making them happy, and I give them insights into the animal life.

"I just make the stories up as I go along! I haven't a clue what I am going to say when I enter the door. Haven't a clue! It just pops into my head when I start.

"As long as they want me, I will continue telling my stories."

"I really like this session. There's obviously lots of these sessions in different libraries. I like this one particularly, as it's our local library and it's a convenient walk from our house.

"It's just lovely, the fact that it's a mixture of adults and senior adults getting involved – and there's a nice age range of children, with the nursery toddlers coming and lots of young babies.

"And obviously for the socialisation aspect, he doesn't have his grandparents close to hand, as they're couple of hours away, so it's good for him to be able to mix with older generations and have these sorts of experiences."

Day in the life of a social worker

The most surprising thing about the job is how welcome I feel in people's homes. I really didn't expect that from being a children's social worker, but so many people are really happy to see me.

I was born in Whipps Cross and raised in Walthamstow, and I love working in my own community – it helps me feel familiarity with the people I meet.

Some people say it's unusual to see a man in the job. I think that's based on some outdated stereotypes about women being more caring. For me, it's been a plus. If there are children without a father figure, for example, I might be able to relate to them in a different way.

One time I was sat playing PlayStation with a teenager, and thought to myself – how is this a job? But it was a great way to make him feel comfortable and start to open up.

There are ups and downs, it's true – it can be challenging. But managers prioritise your needs and your self-care. And there is a very good vibe in the office, more than you might expect from a job that can be difficult.

The families don't always say 'thank you', but when they do, and when you see the change you've helped them through, and had your work recognised – nothing beats that moment.

His thriving parklet has become a mini community


become a mini community space, where people can take a break where children can get creative with chalk, where you can check out the book and seed libraries, or even stop to play a game of chess. The parklet doesn't just benefit people – it's added greenery to the road. Toby says, "I think we need more of these little green stepping stones in urban areas, increasing biodiversity in our streets."

Applications have now opened for anyone to propose a new community parklet in front of their home. You will need to come up with a plan for the parklet and talk to your neighbours to get their agreement, and you will be responsible for looking after the space.

As Toby says: "It's a 10 minute commitment each day to look after, but we think it's well worth it. We have met so many people on our street who we wouldn't have done otherwise. I'd highly recommend it."

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

Supporting young people in Waltham Forest

How to access mental health services and youth spaces

Young people in Waltham Forest can get the support they need when they need it, close to home. We met Zaid, a young resident who is helping raise awareness of young people's mental health, and Lee, a youth worker who supports young people with a safe space to learn, play and grow.

Please note, this article contains mentions of self-harm.



Zaid's story

"I was diagnosed with epilepsy at a young age, and because of that I had many mental health problems, such as depression, anxiety and post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD).

I wasn't socialising with my friends anymore. I was hiding in my bedroom not knowing what was happening to me. I kept on digging myself into a bigger hole. I started to self-harm to find some relief, but that only made things worse.

"I remember when I cried out to my doctors, and they helped me. It was such a relief.

"If you're struggling with mental health, please do reach out for help and remember that support is available and you're not alone.

"When I sought help, I had an amazing support team around me, with my friends and family all there for me. It's important to remember that not everyone's support system is the same – you can find what works for you. If you're finding it hard, Kooth can also help, with support and tools to help young people navigate their mental health."



Lee Benjamin introduces Youth Spaces

"Calling all parents! Waltham Forest Youth Spaces are for young people aged 11 to 25. We offer workshops, life skills, cooking lessons and we play games like table tennis.

"We've got a digital directory where you can find information all about Youth Hubs. Young people can also turn up to any Youth Space: just walk in, sign up and you are here for life.

"We use the power of mentoring and youth work to engage the community and push a narrative of change and positive innovation.

"The whole initiative of the Youth Spaces is to engage more young people, and trying to give more young people a voice and a safe space, which will allow them to grow, and meet new young people who look like them and sound like them, in every sense. And, also, give them positive role models in each space as well, which is really important."

Helping new arrivals settle in

In December 2022, Waltham Forest Council committed to work towards becoming a Borough of Sanctuary

Waltham Forest has a proud history of welcoming refugees, sanctuary seekers and migrants. Becoming a Borough of Sanctuary will see the council working with people with lived experience of seeking refuge, community and voluntary organisations, and local businesses, to follow the principles of the City of Sanctuary movement.

These include:

- welcoming new arrivals and fostering a culture of hospitality to all
- creating opportunities for new friendships between local people and those seeking sanctuary
- celebrating the contributions made by refugees to our community


Talal's story

Talal came to the UK last year with his wife and young family. Originally from Syria, they had been living in Dubai and Bahrain for many years when his application to renew his visa was refused.

With his home country still caught up in a devastating civil war, he says he had two choices: "Go back to Syria, where my children had never lived, or come to Europe. And Syria is not safe for my kids, or for me."

Talal is a popular volunteer at the Welcome Hub, using his own experience to help others settle in the area. "It is a friendly place – a good place," he says.

People seeking asylum aren't allowed to work while their case is heard but Talal has just received notice of leave to remain, which means he can get a job to support his family. "Before coming here, I had 23 years of working, but I have been in the UK more than a year and not been able to. So, I kept myself busy volunteering," he explains. Talal has now been granted leave to remain in the UK.



"Now, I can work!" he says with a smile.

Our Welcome Hub in Lea Bridge Library is a one-stop shop for people who have been placed in the borough while they wait to learn if they have been granted leave to remain in the UK. It's a place to meet others and connect with volunteers who can share their experience and offer support.

Rafia's story

Rafia arrived in the UK after escaping from Afghanistan. Before coming to Waltham Forest, she and her young son lived in shared accommodation with strangers.

Rafia said: "We became homeless in the middle of the night when there was a fire. My son saw everything. Then we were put in emergency accommodation with 10 people – no furniture, nothing. My son was already at school in Waltham Forest, and I was volunteering here, and people we knew eventually helped us to get a place in Walthamstow."

Rafia began helping as a volunteer at the Welcome Hub while her son, who is now seven, attends a local school. Fluent in Pashtu and Persian as well as English, Rafia now has a job as a translator at the Hub, helping others as she was helped herself.

Transforming Vestry House Museum

A much-loved hidden gem situated in Walthamstow Village is about to embark upon a transformation to realise its full potential.

As part of the Levelling Up funded 'Culture for All' programme, the work will make the museum more accessible and inclusive with a culture offer that reflects the borough's diversity. Architects Studio Weave will be working on improvements that will increase the environmental sustainability of the building.

Constructed in 1730, Vestry House is home to a collection of over 100,000 historical objects, including 65,000 photos, as well as the borough's Archives and Local Studies Library. When the project is complete, Vestry House Museum will provide flexible spaces for creatives and for private hire with options for community curation and programming. It will also offer an enhanced education and skills training programme for young people.

As part of the work, the Archives and Local Studies Library Search Room will move to a larger space in Walthamstow Library, which will reopen for appointments in February 2024.

Vestry House Museum will close to the public on Saturday 23 December 2023 and reopen in late 2025.





Sounding a new beat in Waltham Forest's policing

Residents invited to share views on the future of local law enforcement

OUR POLICE, OUR COMMUNITY

OUR SAY

Preparations are well underway for the country's first ever Citizens' Assembly on the Future of Neighbourhood Policing due to take place early next year.

The Assembly, which is being organised by Waltham Forest Council with the backing of the Metropolitan Police, will set out residents' ideas for how they want to see their local areas policed. The initiative is also being supported by The Mayor of London, Sadiq Khan.

Around 10,000 invitations were sent out to people across the borough last month asking them if they would be interested in being one of the 50 people selected to be part of the Assembly.

Those chosen will reflect the diverse make-up of the entire borough. They will meet over three weekends in February and March 2024.

With experts on hand to advise them, they will discuss how they believe policing can be improved in their neighbourhoods. They will then put forward a series of recommendations – for the short, medium and long term - that both the Met Police and the Council have said they will respond to.

Cllr Khevyn Limbajee, Cabinet Member for Community Safety, said: "As a borough we are proud to introduce this innovation in public safety.

"One of the key findings in Baroness Casey's report into the Met Police was that the voice of ordinary Londoners was missing in the way that they are policed.

"We are proud to introduce this innovation in public safety"

"This Citizens' Assembly will be a forerunner in providing that voice. We sincerely hope the ideas that come out of this will make them feel safer in the local areas."

The Assembly will hear

testimony from residents, community leaders and national experts. The Assembly will also hear the views of the wider community, including the findings of a survey on safety and policing that over 1,000 residents responded to this autumn.

The idea for the Assembly follows Baroness Casey's report that highlighted a series of failings into the way the capital was policed.

Chief Superintendent Simon Crick, the North East London Basic Command Unit's borough commander, said: "Our officers in Waltham Forest are hard-working and dedicated to keeping the public safe.

"We want to do everything we can to reassure the communities in which we work of that commitment.

"That is why we are backing the Citizens' Assembly and have a genuine desire to implement changes based on its recommendations."

Apply for a University of Portsmouth London scholarship

It's a big step applying for university, particularly if you're the first in your family or friendship group to move into higher education.

Having a campus on your doorstep, allowing you to live at home and keep in contact with the people you care about will help – and you could also be eligible for financial assistance to help you study.

The following bursaries are available to qualifying residents who receive an offer of a place at University of London Portsmouth's Waltham Forest campus:

Care Leavers' Bursary

Amount: £1,700 for every year of your course Who qualifies? full-time undergraduate or taught postgraduate UK students, for whom one of the following applies:

- you've spent at least 13 weeks in care, some of which was during your teens, and you're leaving the care system in the 12 months before you start university
- you're a 'former relevant child pursuing education.' This usually means you've spent at least 13 weeks in care, some of which was during your teens, but may depend on your local authority
